SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

North Beach Elementary School

North Beach Elementary School is a public elementary school in the Miami-Dade County Public School system in Miami-Dade County, Florida. It is a non-profit governmental institution. North Beach Elementary School has a main campus at 4100 Prairie Avenue, Miami Beach, Florida, and a satellite campus at Mount Sinai Medical Center to service children of Mount Sinai employees. In 2004, North Beach Elementary School was awarded the prestigious Florida Governor's Sterling Award for Quality. Additionally the school has earned an A+ on the State of Florida A+ Plan for five consecutive years and has made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for the past two years. The school is comprised of 52% Hispanic, 39% white Non-Hispanic, 6% Black Non-Hispanic and 3% Asian/Indian Multiracial. The surrounding community is a middle socio-economic neighborhood, and the school includes Standard Curriculum students, ESE students, gifted students, EFL, ESOL, LEP, Out-of-Boundary Transfers and economically disadvantaged students. Many students are members of more than one category.

Our school objectives are aligned with the federal, state and district objectives. The objectives encompass academic, societal and stakeholder objectives. Each segment of the North Beach community works together to achieve the objectives and inculcate the vision of North Beach Elementary School, "To Educate the Whole Child." The school's unique programs engender character building, artistic expression, and a sense of social responsibility.

Given instruction based on the Sunshine State Standards, students in grades three through six will maintain or increase their reading skills as evidenced by 86 percent of the students scoring at or above grade level on the 2006 administration of the FCAT Reading Test.

Given instruction based on the Sunshine State Standards, students in grades three through six will maintain or increase their mathematics skills with 80 percent of students scoring at or above grade level on the 2006 administration of the FCAT Mathematics Test.

Given instruction based on the Sunshine State Standards, students in grade four will maintain their writing skills as evidenced by 98 percent of the students achieving high standards on the 2006 administration of the FCAT Writing Test.

Given instruction using Sunshine State Standards, students in 5th grade will improve their science skills as evidenced by a five point increase in the mean scale score to 320 as documented by the 2006 FCAT Science Test compared to 315 mean scale score in 2005.

Given opportunities to attend a variety of school activities and functions throughout the school year parental involvement will increase from 70 percent of parents attending one or more activities to at least 73 percent.

Given an emphasis on a safe and orderly environment, student behavior will improve as evidenced by a five percent decrease in indoor/outdoor suspensions to 23 during the 2005-2006 school year as compared to 24 during the 2004-2005 school year.

North Beach Elementary will increase the number of computers available for infusion of technology in the curriculum by replacing 20 non operable computers with 20 new computers.

Given instruction based on the Sunshine State Standards, 50 percent of students in Grades 4, 5 and 6 will improve their running skills as evidenced by 50 percent of the students meeting high standards in running the one mile test on the 2005-2006 administration of the Fitnessgram Test.

Given emphasis on the benefits of learning to play a musical instrument, the number of 4th, 5th and 6th grade students participating in string music programs will be increased from 43 students to 46 students.

North Beach Elementary School will improve its ranking on the State of Florida ROI index publication from the 81st percentile in 2003 to the 84th percentile on the next publication of the index.

The school prioritized the following categories as our opportunities for improvement.

The first opportunity for improvement is within the Leadership category:

North Beach Elementary School received a new principal this school year, Mr. Luther Gray. Teachers have the opportunity to participate in school leadership by applying to be grade level or department chairs. Staff members are encouraged to improve their knowledge and skills to seek leadership positions through free TEC courses offered by the district and encouraged by the principal. North Beach Elementary School develops leadership skills through our Leadership Mentoring Program. Mentoring at North Beach is not limited to new teachers or new staff members. Mentoring also includes the mentoring of all staff members; including the mentoring of new administrators in the Sterling Processes and the culture that drives the school.

The second opportunity for improvement is within the Stakeholder Engagement category:

This change of leadership, gives the administration of the school the opportunity to reintroduce the school to the community it serves. Through the process of introducing a new local school administrator to the community, the opportunity exists to build a foundation to forge new mutually beneficial relationships, rekindle long term relationships and exhibit the school as a pillar of strength within the community.

School Demographics

North Beach Elementary School is a public elementary school in the Miami-Dade County Public School system in Miami-Dade County, Florida. It is a non-profit governmental institution. North Beach Elementary School has a main campus at 4100 Prairie Avenue, Miami Beach, Florida, and a satellite campus at Mount Sinai Medical Center to service children of Mount Sinai employees.

The total school student population is comprised of 52% Hispanic, 39% white Non-Hispanic, 6% Black Non-Hispanic and 3% Asian/Indian Multiracial. The surrounding community is a middle socio-economic neighborhood, and the school includes Standard Curriculum students, ESE students, gifted students, EFL, ESOL, LEP, Out-of-Boundary Transfers and economically disadvantaged students. Many students are members of more than one category. The teacher population is comprised of 51% Hispanic, 31% White Non Hispanic, 18% Black. Forty three percent of the teachers hold advanced degrees.

In 2004, North Beach Elementary School was awarded the prestigious Florida Governor's Sterling Award for Quality. Additionally, the school has earned an A+ on the State of Florida A+ Plan for five consecutive years and has made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for the past two years. Our school faculty has won National, State and Local awards as well as many local grants. Additionally, North Beach has been recognized for its outstanding extended foreign language program, art, music, physical education and media programs and its nationally recognized Friend of North Beach teacher assistant program.

The school's strengths include, but are not limited to, a multitude of programs to enhance student achievement, teacher attendance rates and parental involvement. North Beach has identified our opportunities for improvement as new school leadership and stakeholder engagement.

School Foundation

Leadership:

Leadership sets direction of the school by consensus of the key stakeholders, based on the goals and objectives of the state and the district. This is reflected in the Organizational Performance Improvement Self assessment Survey. The mission and vision of the school are shared visually through out the building and by example. The administration has set high level of ethical standards for its faculty and staff to follow. A positive work environment is created with an open door policy for all stakeholders, by walking the building each day and by daily exposure on the Student News Network broadcast. The employees are involved in the day to day operations of the school by establishing committees for major activities in the school.

District Strategic Planning Alignment:

Based on the results of the the Organizational Performance Self Assessment Survey, the School Improvement Plan has developed eleven goals and objectives which have been aligned with the Florida Department of Education and the District Strategic Plan. The employees helped develop the said goals through school wide Continuous Improvement Model (CIM). The results of the CIM's are shared with School Improvement Plan Committee to be incorporated into SIP plan. When the plan is written it then must be approved and or modified by the EESAC committee; thereby ensuring total stakeholder participation.

Stakeholder Engagement:

North Beach Elementary School measures stakeholder satisfaction and engagement through the Organizational Performance Self Assessment Survey. North Beach is committed to stakeholder participation in the school's day to day activities; engaging its participants in every aspect of the schools functions.

Faculty & Staff:

North Beach Elementary School's vision, To Educate the Whole Child, is the driving force that unites the faculty and staff in its pursuit of excellence. Our team approach has shown measurable success as evidenced through our Organizational Performance Self Assessment Survey and our high student performance.

Data/Information/Knowledge Management:

Data collection, analysis, and knowledge management are areas of strength in our school based upon results of the Organizational Performance Self Assessment Survey. Data is disaggregated and analyzed during grade level meeting and faculty meetings. The process enables us to monitor the progress of students what will lead to high quality of education to all students.

Education Design:

North Beach Elementary School determines its key value creation processes through a systematic planning approach utilizing the Organizational Performance Self Assessment Survey and the Continuous Improvement (CIM) models for

continuous improvement both school-wide and in the classroom.

Performance Results:

Results of the Organizational Performance Self Assessment Survey indicate that stakeholders have an overall feeling of safety on school grounds. However the survey suggests an opportunity for improvement and has identified repetitive disruptive behavior and fighting as the main reasons for suspensions.

Students at North Beach Elementary will become life long learners, reading for both knowledge and pleasure at their full potential.

Needs Assessment

Results of the 2005 FCAT Reading Test indicate that 86 percent of students have met the state required mastery level, 70 percent have made annual learning gains and 67 percent of students scoring in the lowest quartile made annual learning gains. Although all student sub groups met Adequate Yearly Progress, the African American AYP group met standards with 72 percent scoring at or above grade level. This is a decline from 2004, when 86 percent of students in this AYP group scored at or above grade level.

Although students in the African American, Hispanic, Limted English Proficiency and Students with Disabilities AYP groups met NCLB standards, percentages scoring at or above grade level declined in all these groups when compared to 2004 FCAT scores.

The EESAC recommends through discussion and consensus no changes of our staffing configuration agreeing that the current configuration meets the needs of North Beach Elementary School.

Student Support Services:

The EESAC recommended that North Beach Elementary School continue to serve its students with a variety of strategies and activities. These include, but are not limited to, providing

for the academic and emotional well being of the students: 1)Before and After School Care programs 2)FCAT Skills after school tutoring 3)the on-site Miami Beach Officer conducting

the school's Drug Awareness program 4)Paraprofessionals to assist learners in the classroom.

Other Matters of Resource Allocation:

Benchmarking:
